



Flagler Services for Homeless Families



Overview

The first transitional housing program of its kind in Virginia, St. Joseph's Villa's Flagler Services for Homeless Families is a comprehensive program that successfully empowers and transitions homeless families with children into permanent housing. This is achieved through the direct delivery of individualized educational, developmental and emotional services through on-campus residential (Flagler Home) and off-campus services. The program has served more than 600 families (including more than 590 mothers and 1,200 children) since its inception in 1989.

Objective

The program's objective is to build stronger children, families and communities by breaking the cycle of homelessness and transitioning homeless families with children into self-sufficient families with permanent housing.

Location

The program is delivered through on-campus and off-campus services, this includes:

On-campus (*For mothers and their children*)

On-campus, temporary housing for families who reside in two cottages on the St. Joseph's Villa grounds. Each cottage has its own kitchen, laundry, living, and play areas. Families have their own private living quarters, which include a bedroom and private bathroom.

Off-campus (*For single mothers, fathers, intact families and inter-generational families*)

Off-campus services are delivered directly to families that have transitioned to permanent housing. These families maintain their own residence off-campus and are assisted by home visits from program staff and other services within the community.

Size

The Flagler Program provides services to more than 50 adults and 75 children at any given time (18 families on- and 24 off-campus).

Services / Acceptance Criteria

Services

- Up to 1 year of transitional housing on the campus of St. Joseph's Villa (for children and their mothers);
- Up to two years of off-campus services (For mothers, fathers, intact families and inter-generational families);
- Full-day and after school children's education/early child development services;
- Child development assessments;
- Job and career counseling, skills training and support;
- Educational and vocational training support and counseling;
- Mental health and abusive relationships counseling;
- Parenting skills training;
- Budgeting and financial planning training;
- Medical assistance; and,
- Support groups and social network building.

Acceptance Criteria

- Referred by a shelter or transitional housing program, self-referral, and meet guidelines for homelessness;
- A head of household who is at least 21 years old (both males and females are eligible but only women heads of household are accepted for on-campus living);
- Custody of at least one child, (On-campus maximum of three children per family that are under age 10 ½; Off-campus also includes teenagers age 17 years of age and under); and,
- Free of active substance abuse: On-campus for at least 1 year; Off-campus for a minimum of 6 months.



Program Requirements / Goals

Program requirements

Once accepted into the program, the head of household agrees to:

- Successfully complete a 30 or 60-day orientation period;
- Follow program guidelines;
- Complete psychosocial and vocational assessments;
- Obtain a general education diploma (GED) within the first six months;
- Pursue educational/vocational training to improve employment opportunities;
- Develop and follow a Family Life Plan;
- Create and follow a family budget and debt reduction plan;
- Meet regularly with staff as assigned;
- Attend all required counseling or support groups; and,
- Work on a housing plan and secure and maintain safe and affordable housing.

Goals

The goals of the program include having participants attain:

- Healthy and educated children;
- Permanent housing;
- Permanent job;
- Financial self-sufficiency;
- An increase in life skills;
- Good physical and emotional health; and,
- An active engagement and participation in the community.

Staff

Staff of 10 is comprised of specially trained, educated and experienced professionals.

St. Joseph's Villa

Established in Richmond in 1834, St. Joseph's Villa is metro-Richmond, Virginia's oldest and largest continuously-operating children's nonprofit organization. The Villa is located on a spacious 82-acre campus in Richmond/Henrico County and builds stronger children, families and communities. The Villa serves more than 500 children and families daily, through the delivery of day, after-school and residential programs that include: special and nontraditional education programs for at-risk youth; education and housing services for homeless children and their families; education and respite, summer and after-school care for children with autism and developmental disabilities; behavioral treatment programs for children and families; housing for adults with disabilities; and a child development center. The Villa is accredited by the national Council on Accreditation and is an approved Medicaid provider for many of its services.
